Alicia Paz selected for S1 | Chatsworth Residency

S1 Artspace is pleased to announce that Alicia Paz has been awarded the S1 | Chatsworth Residency. Alicia will be based at S1 Artspace throughout the summer undertaking research in Sheffield and Chatsworth to inform a new series of ambitious works to be presented at S1 Artspace in spring 2023.

Alicia Paz is a painter and sculptor based in London who studied MA Painting at Royal College of Art in 2008 and Postgraduate Diploma Fine Art at Goldsmiths College, London in 2000.

Born and raised in Mexico, before living in the US, France and now the UK, Alicia's work is informed by her personal experience and offers a reflection on transcultural representation and identity, particularly that of women. Through her paintings and sculptures, Paz explores cultural hybrids, representations of family, and the complexities of kinship and lineage in a globalised world. Her work often incorporates elements from the applied and decorative arts as a tool for interweaving narratives and exploring notions of displacement, identity and illusion.

I am incredibly honoured to be embarking on this residency and exhibition project at S1 Artspace in Sheffield and thrilled to have the chance to research the collections at Chatsworth House Trust in Derbyshire. – Alicia Paz

The S1 | Chatsworth Residency was selected through an international open call, which received almost 300 applications from across 55 countries. The selection panel included artist and musician Linder Sterling, founding director of RESOLVE Collective Seth Scafe Smith, S1 Artspace's Director Louise Hutchinson, and Senior Curator of Programme at Chatsworth Dr Alexandra Hodby.

Established in 1995, S1 Artspace supports artists at key points in their practice by providing opportunities for research, development and the presentation of new work and ideas to engage a broad public audience.
